Archivist's Corner

Have you ever wondered what is in the HSPD Archives? Over the past two years, we've been reviewing our collections in an effort to make materials easier to find. Our mission is not only to collect the history of Palm Desert but also to make it available to you. We have been organizing photos and other historic materials by primary subject category. Most collections are organized alphabetically by name, with some

collections organized into sub-collections. Here's an overview of the current organization at the HSPD:

Buildings (aka Architecture) - Mostly photos and plans of buildings. Includes commercial, residential, community structures and mixed-use complexes.

Business - an entity engaged in commercial, industrial, or professional activities. Organized by type of business: Industry, Dining, Lodging, Retail, Services.

Organization - a group of people organized for a joint purpose or dedicated to a particular interest or activity, or a business, society, or association.

Event - a planned public or social occasion. Often these occur annually (or otherwise regularly). Note: sometimes the event will be filed under the host organization.

Government - the governing body of a nation, state, or community. Organized alphabetically by governmental division.

Maps - a diagrammatic representation of an area of land or sea showing physical features, cities, roads, etc.

Neighborhood - a district or enclave within a town or city. Includes some gated and non-gated developments.

Other Desert Cities - Any of the other cities, communities or unincorporated areas not Palm Desert or Cahuilla Hills. Includes "day-trip" destinations outside of the Coachella Valley.

Parks - Public physical locations, spaces and/or facilities like parks, nature preserves, open space areas, greenways, trails. May include built structures for sport, recreation, or arts programs.

People - Individual persons and distinct groups of people (AKA Native Americans and their tribes, LBGTQ, etc.)

Recreation - Resources and services provided for the purpose of leisure, entertainment, and recreational pursuits. **Special Collections**

HSPD Architecture and Design Committee Report

I was grateful to be able to welcome nine of our twelve Architecture and Design Committee members to an in-person meeting at my Sandpiper home on November 22nd. Although we had some general business, our focus was on the direction of the committee going forward. During a roundtable discussion each member spoke about the priorities they envisioned.

We concluded that we would like to design and implement more walking tours. The preference would be to have these docent-led, but we could have routes and information available at the Firehouse Museum for the public. We could produce pamphlets that contain important and useful information for those interested in historic homes in the area, similar to the booklet produced for our Modernism Week Walking Tours.

There are many possibilities for tours in South Palm Desert. The ones for Modernism Week are in Shadow Mountain. Going forward, we see one beginning at KIngs Point (Hugh Kaptur) west of HWY 74 and travelling through the streets just down the hill (Beavertail. Hedgehog and Pitahaya with architects Walter White, Patten and White, and others) then going into the Sand and Shadows development (Harold Bissner, Sr.) and ending at Sandpiper Circle 3 (William Krisel). We refer to this area as Painters' Path.



Another route focuses on the small inns that are near the Shadow Mountain Resort beginning at the Mojave Inn, then east on Shadow Mountain, winding down various streets in the area and ending at Shadowcliff (John Outcault). And the third idea is West Shadow Mountain including individual private residences, the Purple Hills Estates group (Charles E. Du Bois), and some small condos on Ocotillo (John Outcault).

Last year the Committee began a tradition of hosting one of the HSPD's Friday Night Lectures. Steven Keylon spoke on landscape architect, Tommy Tomson. We will be continuing the tradition on Friday, February 17th. We have an architect in mind, as yet unconfirmed. Stay tuned!

You may see our three Modernism Week Walking Tours in the Shadow Mountain Area on the mornings of February 23rd and 24th. Be sure to wave! These tours completely sold out in one day on the Modernism Week website, which shows that there is a keen and abiding interest in the architecture of South Palm Desert.

IN MEMORIAM

BUFORD CRITES

Buford A. Crites passed away peacefully in Palm Desert on November 12, 2022. He was born in Owensville, Missouri in 1948. He graduated from Owensville High School in 1966, received a BA (double major) in Geology and Communications at Southwest Missouri State Teacher's College in Springfield and obtained a Master's degree in Communications at Illinois State University. After completing PhD work in Montana and the University of Utah, he moved to Palm Desert in 1976 to teach speech at College of the Desert. Buford had a 30-year career at C.O.D. teaching oration, speech preparation, and debate tactics.

Buford spent his life in service to others and to his community. He served on the Palm Desert Planning Commission followed by 20 years on the Palm Desert City Council, including four terms as Mayor. He oversaw the expansion of Palm Desert and at the same time worked to conserve and preserve the surrounding areas for future generations. Buford was a member and supporter of the Historical Society of Palm Desert, and served on its Board of Directors after retirement.

An avid conservationist, Buford fought for open space and conservation of the Coachella Valley, the place he called home for almost 50 years. He was a founding board member of the Coachella Valley Mountains Conservancy and the Friends of the Desert Mountains. He helped establish the Santa Rosa and San Jacinto Mountains National Monument, dedicated in 2000. Over a 10-year period he helped broker the Coachella Valley Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan that will

guide development and conservation in our part of Eastern Riverside County for decades to come.

Buford served on numerous boards and committees including the Coachella Valley Association of Governments, the Coachella Valley Conservation District, the South Coast Air Quality Management District, the Mojave Desert Land Trust, the Living Desert, and the California Rare Fruit Growers, Inc. Governors Arnold Schwarzenegger and Jerry Brown both appointed Buford to the Colorado River Regional Water Quality Control Board.


Buford was very knowledgeable about the history of the Colorado and Mojave Deserts, and particularly about his favorite pioneer, Randall Henderson. Buford saved a portion of Randall's archive and was involved in the creation of the Randall Henderson Trail.


